### A LETTER FROM THE OIC

It has now been ten months since I commenced as Officer in Charge, and I can genuinely say I am enjoying both the challenge and opportunity that comes with the role. The Bellarine is a unique and proud community, and it has been a privilege getting to know many of you during this time.

From a staffing perspective, we have recently filled a number of vacancies, which has strengthened our ability to deliver frontline policing services. This has allowed us to increase our visibility across the community, including deploying dedicated patrol cars targeting driver behaviour, as well as expanding our bike patrol presence in key areas.

I have also made a commitment to improving accessibility to the station. We are now open for public enquiries between 10:00am and 6:00pm every Tuesday and Thursday, with additional days available when staffing permits. I encourage community members to drop in with any concerns or queries.

Finally, I want to address what is becoming a significant national issue – young people riding illegal and modified e-bikes in a dangerous manner.

This is not something we can simply police our way out of. It is a shared responsibility that starts at home. Parents and guardians must take an active role in ensuring their children are using safe and legal equipment.

If your child is riding a modified or illegal e-bike, the choice is simple: remove access to the bike and dispose of it. If you would prefer, I am happy to accept these bikes at the station if you wish to sign them over for destruction.

We also need the community's support. If you are aware of young people riding these bikes dangerously, please report it to Crime Stoppers either via their website [www.crimestoppersvic.com.au](http://www.crimestoppersvic.com.au) or by calling 1800 333 000. Reports can be made anonymously and will come directly to me. Providing an address at a minimum, and ideally a name or description, allows us to follow up directly with responsible adults and take appropriate action.

Working together, we can continue to keep the Bellarine a safe and enjoyable place for everyone.

## ROAD SAFETY – EASTER AND SCHOOL HOLIDAYS

With the conclusion of a highly successful long-weekend road policing operation under Operation Nexus across the Bellarine.

Portarlington Police members conducted a preliminary breath test (PBT) site on Jetty Road, Clifton Springs. The first vehicle intercepted returned a positive PBT and was subjected to an evidentiary breath test (EBT) at the site. The driver recorded a **BAC of 0.216** and was issued with an immediate licence suspension.

While awaiting the impound tow, a second driver was intercepted and returned a positive PBT. Subsequent EBT analysis recorded a **BAC of 0.191**, resulting in a further immediate driving ban. Both vehicles were conveniently impounded on the same tow truck.

These results build on earlier enforcement activity over the weekend, with Bellarine and Portarlington processing four drivers for EXPCA offences on Friday and Portarlington Police members processing an additional driver on Saturday.

Police are reminding the community that drink driving remains one of the leading causes of serious injury and fatal collisions on our roads.

Choosing to drive after drinking not only puts your own life at risk, but also the lives of your passengers and other road users.

This Easter period has shown that enforcement will continue, and those who make the wrong choice will be detected. Plan ahead, arrange a designated driver, or use alternative transport. There is no excuse for drink driving.



**ANZAC DAY BELLARINE**

On Saturday 25 April, many members of our community gathered at ANZAC services held across the Bellarine to honour and remember those who have served our nation.

As the sun rose and the sound of the bugle echoed through the morning air, we paused in quiet reflection, acknowledging the courage, sacrifice and enduring spirit of our ANZACs who have given so much for our country.

Services were held throughout the Bellarine, including in Leopold, Drysdale, Portarlington, St Leonards, Barwon Heads, Ocean Grove and Queenscliff, with strong community attendance at each location.

Representing Victoria Police, Bellarine members Senior Sergeant PARRELLO attended the morning service, where he paid their respects and laid a wreath in honour of those who have served.

## HOME PROPERTY SECURITY: SIMPLE STEPS TO STAY SAFE THIS AUTUMN

As we head into the cooler months across the Bellarine Peninsula, it's a good time to think about home and property security. With daylight savings settling in and our days getting shorter and more people spending time away during school holidays and weekends, opportunistic theft can become more common.

The good news is that a few simple steps can make a big difference in protecting your home and belongings.

One of the most important things residents can do is lock up consistently. Many thefts from homes and cars occur when doors are left unlocked. Always ensure your house, garage, and vehicles are secured even when you're home or just stepping out briefly.

Outdoor lighting is another effective deterrent. Motion sensor lights at entry points or along driveways can discourage unwanted visitors and make it easier for neighbours to notice unusual activity.

If you're going away, consider ways to make your home look lived in. This might include asking a neighbour to collect your mail, putting bins out and in, or using timers on lights. Small details can help prevent your property from appearing vacant.

We also encourage residents to be mindful of parcel deliveries. With online shopping more popular than ever, unattended packages can be an easy target. If possible, arrange delivery to a secure location or have parcels sent to a workplace or collection point.

Don't forget about sheds and garages, which often contain valuable tools, bikes, and equipment. Make sure they are locked and consider marking or recording serial numbers for valuable items.

Finally, strong communities are one of the best crime prevention tools we have. If you notice anything unusual or suspicious in your neighbourhood, report it to police. Looking out for one another helps keep the Bellarine a safe and welcoming place for everyone.

# Police 131 444

Save 000 for emergencies

Victoria Police officially launched a 24-hour police assistance phone line and online reporting service for the community to connect with about non-urgent crimes and events. All Victorians are encouraged to contact the Police Assistance Line on 131 444 or visit the Victoria Police Online Reporting service to report non-urgent crimes and events.

The Police Assistance Line and Online Reporting service will take reports or give advice at any time on non-urgent crimes and events anywhere in the state, including:

- property damage
- lost or located property
- theft
- absence from residence registrations
- PartySafe registrations
- other general non-urgent police enquiries

The Online Reporting service is available through the new look Victoria Police website, which improves the way police information and services are found and understood online

The Police assistance Line calls are taken by civilian staff at a contact centre in Ballarat, under the supervision of police.

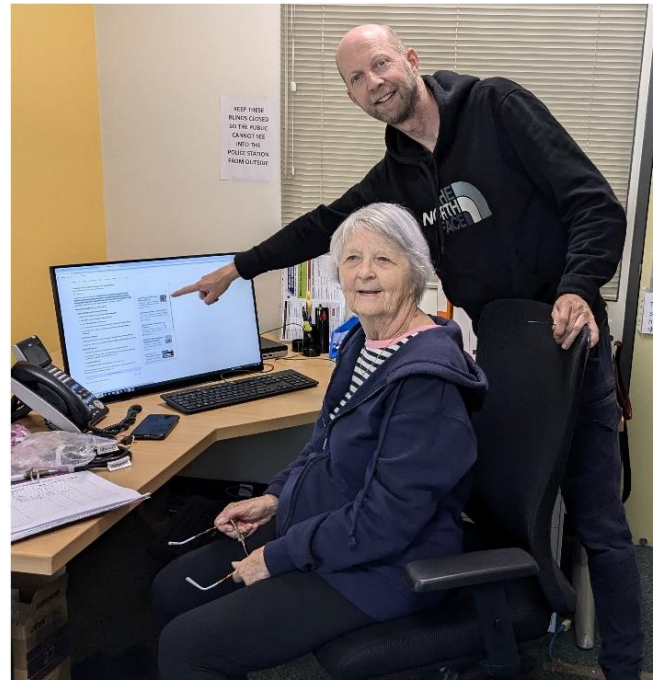
The new computers provide our office staff with up to date technology and are a joy to use.

### “The Long Way Home”

Helen used to measure her days in small, manageable pieces. Breakfast. Medication. A short walk if the weather held. Lunch. Rest. Dinner. Bed. Since Arthur’s diagnosis of early dementia, routine had become her anchor. Predictability helped her cope.

Arthur still insisted he was “fine to drive.” And for a while, Helen let him — short trips only. The local shops. The pharmacy. Familiar roads. “He’s still himself,” she would tell their daughter. “I don’t want to take everything away all at once.”

But underneath, there was a constant hum of worry. One Tuesday morning, Arthur picked up his keys. “Just ducking out,” he said casually. “Where to?” Helen asked, trying to sound light. “Oh... just a drive. Something in her chest tightened. “Arthur, maybe I’ll come with you.”

“No, no,” he waved her off. “I’ll be ten minutes.” The door closed before she could answer. Ten minutes passed. Then twenty. Helen stood at the kitchen window, watching the empty driveway. After forty minutes, she called his mobile. It rang out. After an hour, her hands began to shake.

She called again. This time, he answered. “Helen?” His voice was thin, uncertain. “Arthur! Where are you?” A long pause. “I... I don’t know.” Her stomach dropped. “What can you see?” “Trees. A road. There’s... a sign but

I don’t recognise the name.”

“Stay where you are,” she said quickly, forcing calm into her voice. “Don’t go anywhere. I’ll come get you.” But she didn’t know where “there” was.

For the next hour, Helen stayed on the phone while trying to piece together clues — a passing truck company name, a glimpse of a street sign he couldn’t quite read, the sound of traffic in the background.

Her mind was racing, but then she remembered. They were registered with the Bellarine Community Support Register.

With shaking hands, Helen called the police and explained the situation. The officer immediately understood the situation and Helen stayed on the phone with Arthur while police went about their work.

Eventually, he was located several suburbs away. By the time Helen reached him, Arthur was sitting in the car, confused and exhausted - a police vehicle nearby. “I was just going for a drive,” he said, as she helped him into the passenger seat. “I thought I knew the way.”

The next day, Helen received her weekly call from the Bellarine Community Support Register Volunteer and explained what had happened.

‘I’m so tired,’ Helen explained as a bone-deep exhaustion from always being alert, always anticipating and always holding everything together, crept in.

Shortly after ending the call, Helen considered the discussion with the volunteer and made another ..... to a local carer support service seeking help.

### Neighbourhood Watch BBQ Promotes Safety on the Bellarine

A community-focused initiative brought families together on Wednesday, 8 March, as eight Neighbourhood Watch Bellarine volunteers teamed up with Bellarine Bayside Park manager David Spelman to host a successful BBQ during the busy school holiday period.

Blessed with beautiful weather, the event attracted many visiting families, with children arriving on bikes and scooters to enjoy a free BBQ sausage. A key focus of the event was promoting bike safety and raising awareness about protecting personal property from theft.

Young attendees learnt practical tips on keeping their bikes secure. Children received stickers and home safety-themed pictures to colour, helping reinforce important safety messages in an engaging way

Parents were also well catered for with one way number plate safety screws, personal alarms, anti-scan safety pouches for electronic car keys and invisible marking pens available for purchase. These pens allow owners to discreetly mark bikes, scooters and other valuable equipment at home - making it easier for police to identify and return stolen items if they are recovered.

In addition, a range of informative brochures covering home, car, school, and business safety were provided, ensuring families left with valuable knowledge to help keep their households and communities safe

The event highlighted the strength of community collaboration and the ongoing commitment of local volunteers to promoting safety across the Bellarine region.

## A MESSAGE FROM OUR HIGHWAY PATROL

Senior Constable DUNN and Senior Constable ELSWORTHY from our Highway Patrol Unit were working on a night shift.

At approximately 9:37PM on Tuesday the 7<sup>th</sup> of April, they have detected a motorcycle travelling south on the Princes Hwy, Lara, travelling at 160km/hr in a 100 zone.

The Highway unit has followed the motorcycle through the Geelong CBD before Police helicopter took over, who assisted in following as an arial platform. Police helicopter-maintained observation on the motorcycle where it has reached speeds exceeding 280km/hr whilst touring most of the Bellarine. At one stage was detected near Wallington at 312km/hr.

The motorcycle was followed to a Leopold address where the male rider was arrested by Highway Patrol unit for Reckless Conducted Endangering Life. The motorcycle impounded for 30 days at a cost of \$1305. Male charged and bailed to Geelong Magistrates Court.



## CRIME STOPPERS VICTORIA

Crime Stoppers is an independent not-for-profit organisation that partners with the community, media and police to encourage people to prevent crime and to confidentially share what they know about unsolved crime or suspicious activity.

Crime Stoppers believes everyone has the right to feel safe from crime. We share practical advice on how you can protect your community, and the people and things that are important to you.

When you make a report, you don't have to leave your personal details with us, your call isn't recorded and, if you make a report online, your IP address isn't stored. You are in control of the reporting process – you choose how much information you share and whether you want to remain anonymous.

Since its start in Victoria in 1987, they have received over 1.33 million tips from the community, resulting in over 27,600 arrests and the recovery of more than \$406 million worth of drugs, property and cash.

Police provided the community members with information, strategies and resources specifically aimed at helping you stay safe.

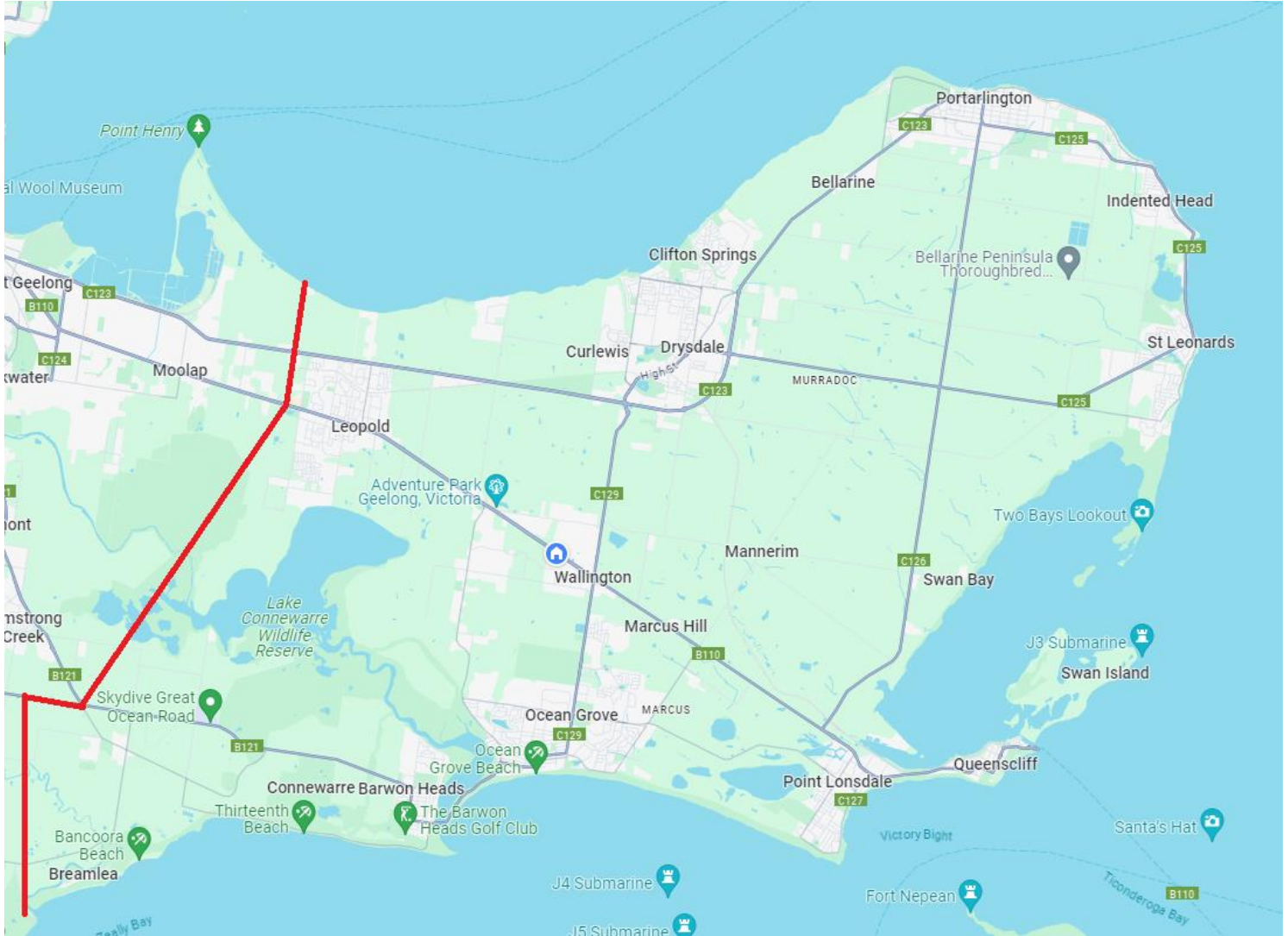
The Bellarine Police Neighbourhood Unit has been conducting information sessions such as these to schools, community groups and businesses to provide an active, visible presence in the community.
